

## A Level French



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### Why choose to study French at A Level?

- There are currently 67.8 million people with French as their first language, and it is spoken in 60 countries around the world
- French is the only language other than English spoken on five continents. French and English are global languages
- France is the world's largest manufacturer of television sets (HDTV was invented in France)
- The French are leaders in medical genetics
- The French are the world's third largest manufacturers of electronics equipment
- France is the fourth largest producer of cars in the world
- France is the European leader in aerospace
- France is a major world research centre in the field of high energy physics
- More tourists visit France than any other country in the world
- French, along with English, is the official working language of:- The United Nations, the International Olympic Committee, the International Red Cross, the Council of Europe, the European Court of Justice
- French is the language of philosophers: Sartre, Camus, Proust, Rousseau, Voltaire
- French is the language of poets and love!

# Classroom and homework activities in the French Department

The French Department aims to keep the French students up to date with what is going on in France now, hence the use of online resources, magazines and other authentic stimuli. The French library shelves are re-stocked every year (especially after the homestay visit to Angers!) with contemporary and classic works of literature as well as French magazines such as Paris Match and Phosphore.

#### Activities in class include:

- Debating contemporary issues
- Pair/group work
- Translating (from French into English and from English into French)
- Listening to podcasts and recordings from French television and radio
- Summarising newspaper and magazine articles
- Watching and commenting on films (cinema and movie studies are part of the A Level syllabus)
- Essay writing about the novel Bonjour Tristesse by Françoise Sagan, and the film Au Revoir Les Enfants
- Grammar drills and exercises (often using online resources)
- Vocabulary-building using interactive websites
- Oral lessons with our French language assistant
- Oral presentations in class or recorded
